Mayor Liccardo and Councilmembers,

On Tuesday evening, you will receive a report that details how the city-owned golf courses are costing the city money, and you will consider how to proceed. I urge that you vote to keep the properties for the public's use and enjoyment as parklands, either retained for golf or repurposed for other uses such as soccer or open-space.

As I said at the Oct. 7th Parks & Rec. Commission meeting, the Los Lagos Golf Course was city-owned parkland before the golf-course was built, and if the course is removed, it would need to go back to parkland. (I was on the Coyote Creek Long-range Land Utilization Task Force in 1990 when the golf course was first proposed, and I fought against the initial plans that called for chopping down trees all along the creek so that golf could be played back and forth over the denuded creek channel. As a side benefit, it was that task force that first crafted a riparian setback policy.) If Los Lagos were to be closed, portions of the land could be used for soccer and other field-sports, community gardens, open space, and enhanced streamside habitat.

Rancho Del Pueblo is a rather land-locked parcel in an open-space-deprived district. It is a small 9-hole course and driving range, and host to First Tee – a rather special youth program. If golf is not viable on that site, I would recommend converting part of the land to soccer or other community-serving open space use. It is not appropriate to sell it off for high-density housing, as the area has poor access. Also, there are wetlands on part of the site that should be preserved. The San José Neighborhoods Commission wrote the Council a letter in May 2012 in support of preserving Rancho Del Pueblo, citing the need for "inner-city-green-space".

I am not a golfer myself, nor much of a fan of the financial and environmental impacts of golf courses. However, they are city-owned park lands in in a city that is deficient in regional open-spaces.

Please, vote to keep the golf course lands for the public's use.
